DNA Update

The Dunbar/Edgar DNA testing that is ongoing through Dr. **Bruce Cockburn** of Edmonton, Alberta, is turning out some fascinating results. For instance, we now have extensive testing done on four **Edgar** males who matched Dunbar DNA in the initial testing 'way back. Here we present the most recent chart, showing the latest results of **Andrew Edgar**, **Colin Edgar**, **Jim Edgar**, and **Raymond Croxford**. (You may have to blow it up to read the fine print.)

I asked Bruce Cockburn if there was any indication of when the Edgars split away from the Dunbars. Here is his response:

Hi James,

...We now have three SNP-defined subbranches. You should be able to create finer subbranches within the SNP-defined subbranches using the STR mutations that you tested for earlier.

It's hard to tell when the Edgars (and Cockburns) separated from the Dunbars. The evidence suggests that the split must have happened within a few hundred years of 1072, when Earl Gospatric settled in the Borders after rebelling unsuccessfully against William the Conqueror. The Cockburns provide some insight over the timing for the split that led to the Edgars. The Group A Cockburns were definitely separated from the Dunbars by 1330 (when Sir Alexander de Cokburn, a Group A Cockburn, married Mariota de Veteripont). But there was an even earlier separation between the genetically distinct Group A and B Cockburns. Like the Cockburns, the

Edgars have no known shared SNPs with the Dunbars after SNP S5750, which probably appeared near the time of Gospatric. This isn't a solid proof, but the evidence seems to point to a fairly early split of the Edgars from the Dunbars after the time of Gospatric. The A1778 deletion mutation seems to be a good genetic definition for the root of the L257 Edgars. I wonder what proportion of your family has this mutation. In the case of the Cockburns, it seems that about 75% of men have the root FGC15269 mutation.

All of this is not just idle speculation, since the early **Edgar** history from **J.H. Lawrence-Archer** in *An Account of the Sirname Edgar* indicates that the family was firmly established (including marriages and offspring, that is) by 1176, and probably earlier.

Furthermore, I contend that the **Edgars** we've tested, with six different DNA types, are all related back to **Cospatrick III** (or **Gospatric**, for the purists), 2nd Earl of Dunbar. There is likely no way to prove such a statement, nor is there any way to *dis*prove it! It remains clear, though, that extraneous DNA can enter a family in any number of ways, and the most common is through what we now term an NPE (Non-Paternal Event, i.e. we don't know who the father is). If, say some 1000 years ago, a Viking male impregnated an R1b **Edgar** female, and she or her parents raised the child (assuming it was a male baby) as an **Edgar**, we now have two Y-DNA types named **Edgar**, the second one being my I1 Haplogroup—the Norwegian Vikings. The same could have happened with the Saxon Haplotype, the I2b1s. And, so on. The E, H, and J types are not that easy to explain, but the process is sound. Perhaps SteveUK is right that his ancestor had a kebab shop on Hadrian's Wall!

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Changing the subject a bit, I extend a large "Thank You!" to those donors who have contributed to the Edgar DNA Trust Fund. It is through those generous donations that we've been able to help out with the extended testing organized by **Dr. Bruce Cockburn**.
